#### **GOOD NEWS!**

#Training

- Operation Star the name for our cross border joint Operation with South Yorkshire Police continues to deploy regularly, tackling criminals who travel into our County across our borders to commit crime. We share intelligence and organise pro-active patrols to ensure criminals are brought to justice
- 5 diggers stolen from Nottinghamshire were recovered by South Yorkshire Police, 2 Quad Bikes remain outstanding but the diggers were traced to a location using Trackers please ensure your vehicle either has a factory or after-market tracker fitted so that we can re-unite you with your valuable equipment if stolen. MP's are pushing legislation to make it a legal requirement for Quad Bikes to have trackers fitted due to their desirability
- Throughout November we received
   45 phone calls reporting a Wildlife
   Crime, all bar 1 of these were graded
   for an officer to attend immediately or
   contact to be made by our
   neighbourhoods team the following
   day showing our commitment to act
   upon reports of animals in immediate
   danger
- Funding has been secured with National Highways to prepare signage for HGV drivers along the A1 in Bassetlaw due to us still receiving high numbers of reports of stolen fuel. Signage will be placed on litter bins in layby's in over 6 different languages advising drivers of the risks and hopefully reducing the amount of vehicles parking overnight, vulnerable to fuel thieves
- In October PC Hollie Marsh and I visited Bassetlaw Focus on Farmers who run a collaborative project designed to address the unique mental and physical health needs of the Bassetlaw farming community. A dierectory of support is accessible to farmers and the rural community via their website to all Bassetlaw residents.

Training our officers and staff and equipping them with the specialist knowledge to deal with wildlife and rural crime remains our priority. The last few months have seen further training delivered:

- The Winter CPD Training at Attenborough Nature Reserve over 20 members of Control room staff, CSI and Neighbourhoods officers attended a day supported by Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust where sessions were held by the RSPB on Bird Crime especially Birds of Prey, the RSPCA who delivered an update on the Animal Welfare Act and Naturewatch Foundation who refreshed officer knowledge on Op Recall fosucing on Livestock attacks and their support of the fight against Wildlife Offenders
- Officers from Neighbourhoods and Response joined
  National Rural Crime Lead Martin Beck who delivered an
  online session in his specialism of Livestock Theft including
  the transport and sale of animals, licencing, trading
  standards, tagging and regulations in addition to the
  specific questions to ask when animals are reported as
  missing
- Officers and staff attended Plantworx 2025 at the Newark Showground where a special training day was held by the National Rural Crime Leads again in Vehicle and Machinery theft, with partners Datatag. Officers received an update on where machinery goes once stolen and those golden hours after a report comes in
- All members of our Force Control Room have now received their basic refresher training on Wildlife Crime and how to handle reports, supported by Jim Clark of Naturewatch Foundation staff learned what offenders are capable of, how we can best respond to a call of a suspected Wildlife Crime and the types of offences these offenders are usually also involved with
- Inspector Rob Harrison and our two Wildlife Crime CSI staff attended this year's National Wildlife Crime Conference at Wyboston Lakes, a key date in the diary to ensure our force is up to date with partners and other forces techniques in tackling Wildlife Crime
- Our next cohort of Police Constables and Special
   Constables had their initial Rural and Wildlife Crime
   Training provided in person by myself giving them the skills
   they need to recognise these types of crime and how to
   act during their first few months under supervision
- Our Cadet leaders received training from Mark Harrison at Historic England and will be visiting scheduled monuments in their Local Area, providing a simple condition report and updating recent images on the online map to ensure these are recorded in the event of any Heritage Crime

# Please have your say

Reporting crime or suspicious behaviour remains the single most important thing you can do to help us tackle all forms of crime which affects your community, without reports the recordings do not show the crime has taken place, and without this we are unable to help

- If you are a member of a Rural Whatsapp group and you see something you feel should be reported to Police, please encourage that user to report it, without intelligence we cannot build a pattern of what's happening in your area. This is the single most useful thing you can do to help
- Use What3Words to help pinpoint where you saw the crime, please give this information to the call handler or include in your online report
- Report suspicious activity, if something doesn't look right, if someone is on your land without permission, if someone is riding along a footpath or bridleway and you're not sure they should be, if you have felt intimidated or threatened by the behaviour of others whilst in a rural or isolated area, please report it
- If you are concerned about a fellow farmer, landowner, neighbour, colleague, partner or young person, there are organisations who can help you and them to get access to the support they might need
